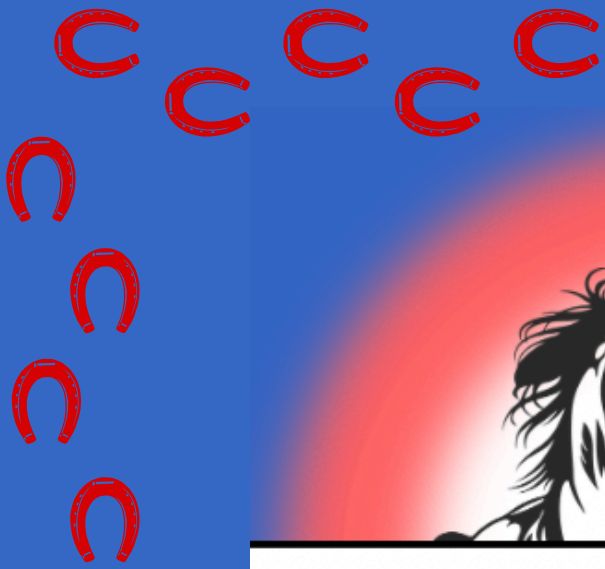

ABOUT THE BBTC

The Battle of the Best (BBTC) is a competition featuring trainers from all over the Midwest. These trainers have from April 5th to July 26th to work with an unstarted horse and train it to the best of their ability. Then it's time to compete against all other trainers in a battle to find out who is the best.

This is our 2nd year running the BBTC. There will be 4 divisions for horses and trainers. Division 1 is for unstarted horses shown at the walk, trot, canter. Division 2 is for unstarted 3 yr olds shown at the walk and trot. Division 3 is for horses that have been started but need more training or can benefit from more training. Peewee Division is for horses under the age of 2 that cannot be ridden yet.

The horses in the BBTC come from rescue situations or horse breeders and their backgrounds are all different. These horses were taken in by Lucky 7 Horse Rescue in Isanti, MN to be in the challenge and are offered for sale following a brief approval process.

All horses except those in the Peewee division will be available for sale at the event! Starting bid is \$2000!

All horses at time of sale will be up to date on vaccines, have had their teeth recently floated, be dewormed, and carry a current negative Coggins test. Each horse was vet checked for soundness and overall health in March.

Robin Secrist

At K&R Ranch you will find Robin Secrist hard at work. Robin has trained horses since he was a child. Robin has two specialties, (1) training young horses and preparing horses for endurance trail riding and (2) training horses with problems so their owners can leave with the animal that they want to take home with them. For Robin, training horses comes as naturally as breathing. His hard work ethic and fearless attitude makes him one of the most sought-after horse trainers in the area.

Over the past 45 years Robin has probably trained in the neighborhood of 4,000 horses. Ideally horses learn basic lessons at an early age (too young to be ridden) so when they are old enough to be ridden they will already be trained to understand their role; and be able to handle a range of activities that might 'spook' an untrained horse.

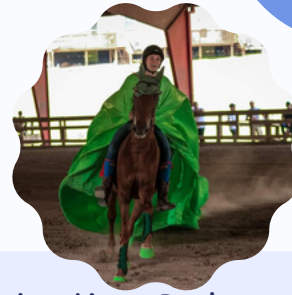
Robin believes in understanding the psyche of each individual horse and providing individualized training through kindness and repetition to get the horse to willingly submit to the owner's requirements.

Not only did she practice judging through 4-H, but she was also on her collegiate judging team at the University of Minnesota Crookston where she got a Bachelor's Degree in Equine Science. Most recently, she helps organize and judges the Battle of the Best Training Competition. She has been all over in her pursuit of working with horses, including New Jersey at the Standardbred Retirement Foundation, and Kentucky at a breeding farm called Willowbank.



Kendra Putzke

Kendra, the other K in K&K, has been riding for over 15 years with lots of her experience being in the show ring. Her first horse was a free, green pony mare she trained all the way up to a successful show mount. While studying at the University of Minnesota Crookston, she rode for the equestrian team, got judging experience, and started a young, Gypsy Vanner stallion. The Fedewa's got her interested in helping rescue horses, and she went on to intern at the Standardbred Retirement Foundation in New Jersey retraining and adopting out Standardbreds. Since graduating college, Kendra has trained horses with Kaitlyn, got a golden retriever puppy, and moved to Florida to work under Adrienne Lyle for the show season. Now she's been home this summer training her own horses, driving the Fedewa ponies, and hiking with her dog.

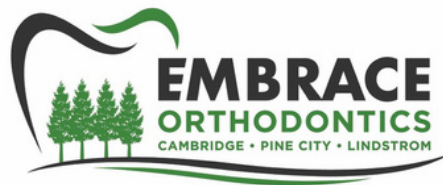

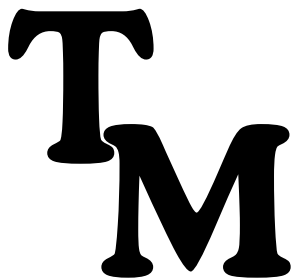

BBTC Trainer: Dawson Alme

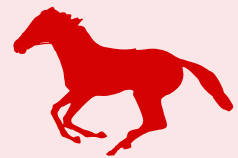
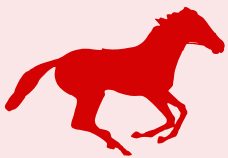
Alma, Wisconsin

BBTC Horse: Tempest

9 yr old Morab Mare

Tempest has already defied the odds, and she deserves a chance at a life without fear of her future. Tempest showed up in Ryon's Kill Pen in June of 2022. A generous lady bailed her from the pen, but didn't have a place for her to go. We then offered to home her after quarantine. Tempest was bailed with two other horses, and they all struggled immensely. One horse that had been rescued from the pen previously had just died of pneumonia, so people were desperate to get these horses out of there.

This small herd wasn't lucky either. They too suffered from pneumonia in quarantine. At one point, Tempest even went down. Administering medicine was extremely hard because she was untouchable and traumatized. All medications had to be given through the shoot, and that caused such a panic that she went down. Luckily, she pulled through. A friendly, emaciated Arab she came in with wasn't so lucky. The herd of three was down to two, even after fighting extremely hard.

After quarantine, Tempest was still extremely terrified. Just to get a halter on her, Robin Secrist (one of our judges) trained her for a month to get her halter-broke and handleable.

She has since been decompressing and learning from our other horses how to be a horse and not be terrified all the time. She has become a lot friendlier and will make someone a wonderful partner after being given a chance with some training.



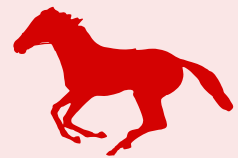
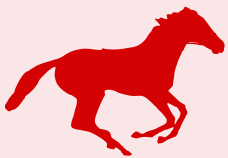

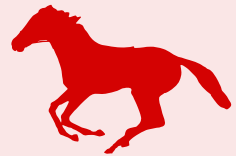
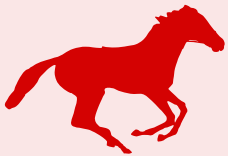


BBTC Trainer: Anne Senger *Isanti, Minnesota*

BBTC Horse: Whisper *8 yr old Arabian Mare*

Whisper came out of Stroud, Oklahoma in November of 2024. She and another Arabian mare were posted running around in a pen, scared of people. They had old wounds from halters digging into their faces and we're skittish around people. Because we were already getting two others at that point and no one was willing to take them, we said load them onto our trailer! When they got to quarantine, they had a respiratory illness that they were treated for. It's a very common thing we see with these kinds of rescues.



Whisper was the more confident of the two, and we were able to make more progress with her first. She accepted the blanket in a relatively short session, and that relaxed her a lot. She started to see us as the "good people" and now she is friendly and will come up to you in the field and even allow you to catch her.

She shows a ton of potential, and we hope we can show her how great people can be!

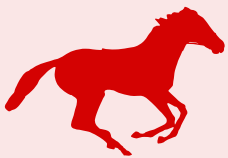
BBTC Trainer: Sarah Erickson *Spring Valley, Wisconsin*

Sarah Erickson has been around horses all of her life growing up in Isanti and relocating to Western Wisconsin after college. She started training horses when she got an abused Arabian for her first horse. After quickly outgrowing him, she bought her horse Flower and trained her through the Isanti County 4-H horse training program. She won 5 trips to the Minnesota State 4-H Horse Show, placing every year she went. This year after having Flower for 30 years she passed away at age 31.

Sarah has been involved in many areas of horses. She showed 4-H as a youth and attended UW-River Falls getting her B.S. in Animal Science - Equine Business. Sarah has also competed in Rodeos and endurance racing, tried Fox Hunting and a pentathlon, and now competes in Dressage, Eventing, and Hunter/Jumper. Sarah has been a volunteer for St. Croix County 4-H in western Wisconsin chairing Dressage and Hunter over Fences and also helping out with Trail and Pleasure shows. In 2020 Sarah and her daughter Lana, took the long trip to Scottsdale Arizona to participate in sport horse, dressage, and jumping shows at the Arabian show with a horse out of her endurance mare.

Sarah has worked with a lot of horses that have needed to have behavior modification to become safe horses for their owners. Sarah works with the horse to relieve stress and tension. Sarah became a certified Equine Massage Therapist to understand the mechanics of a working horse and to pamper her training horses. She treats all the horses she trains as her own, spending quality time with them outside of riding. She believes a horse needs to be pushed at a rate the horse can accept the training and to keep it interesting so the horse doesn't get bored. She likes to cross-train her horses so they can do a lot of different events.

Sarah is not particular to any breed but prefers taller horses. She currently owns 3 Arabians, an OTTB and a Holsteiner. Sarah looks forward to participating in the Battle of the Best Training Competition to test her skills with a bit of a time crunch.



BBTC Horse: Lyra *7yr old Grade Quarter Horse Mare*

Lyra came from Stroud, Oklahoma after being found in a kill pen. She was a beautiful mare with so much potential in her. She has a brand on her hip that is believed to belong to a mexican breeder in Texas that breed youth rodeo horses. She also came in with a two year old stud colt, who just happened to be Paladin.

After quarantine, she was trained in the 4-H Training Project for Level 1, which includes leading, picking up feet, and tying. 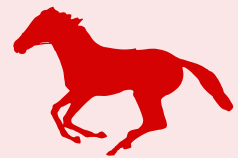
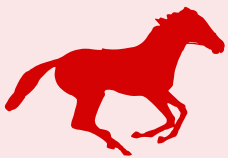

7yr old Registered Appaloosa Gelding



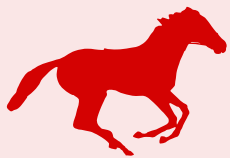

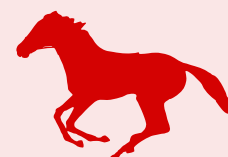
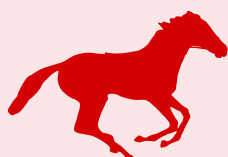


BBTC Trainer: Katie Livingood *Dodge Center, Minnesota*

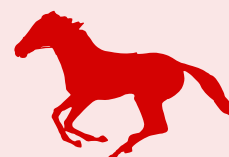
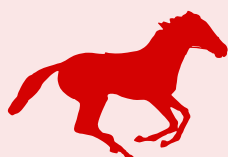

She has shown much progress in this aspect after being in a herd of other horses that don't have to fight for every scrap. She is a very fancy girl and she can go very far in life if given the chance.

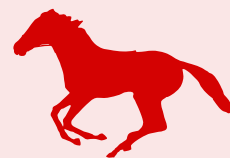
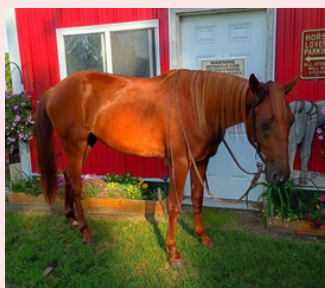
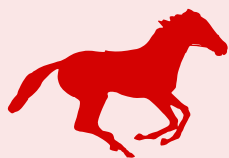

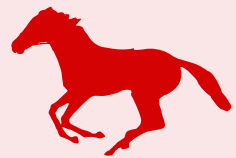
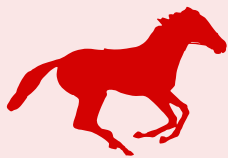


BBTC Trainer: Ally Pink *Hutchinson, Minnesota*

BBTC Horse: Belle *16yr old Branded Standardbred Mare*

"Inaugural Belle" is a Standardbred that came out of Stroud, Oklahoma in November of 2024. She was advertised as mare that was possibly pregnant. Lucky 7 Horse Rescue took her in to be in their pregnant mare & foal program and their Standardbred program.

Belle came to us in a herd of four (all others are in the challenge too!) and she has always been very nice and calm. She immediately started gaining weight and once she was done with quarantine, we had her preg checked.

No baby, just the figure of a mare that's had many.

She is a very promising mare and we love Standardbreds so we decided to put her in Division 3.

Upon initial vet check, we found that she had extreme problems in her mouth that needed to be fixed. She had extreme sharp points, a cracked tooth, and two teeth total that needed to be removed. She underwent dental surgery and has the all clear to join the BBTC!

She deserves a great future and furthering her training will help do just that!

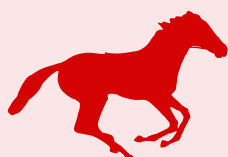

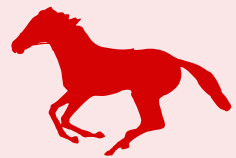
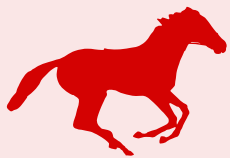


BBTC Trainer: Isabella Anderson *Bemidji, Minnesota*

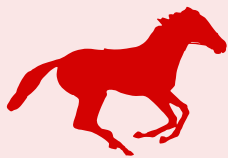
BBTC Trainer: Saydi Sweet *Sauk Centre, Minnesota*

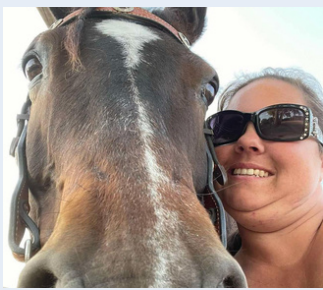

BBTC Trainer: Leah Ward *Stanchfield, Minnesota*

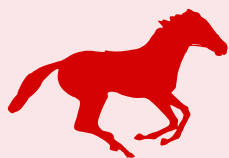
Hi. My name is Leah Ward and my family and I moved to Stanchfield, MN in August 2023 and opened up a horse boarding facility.

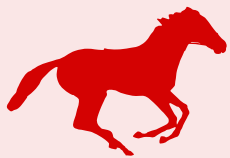




BBTC Trainer: Blayne Sweet

Her curiosity and friendliness is going to translate well into her training and help her turn into a fantastic partner for someone.

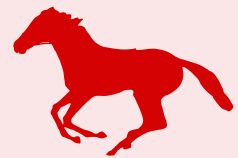
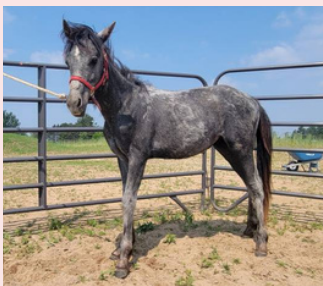
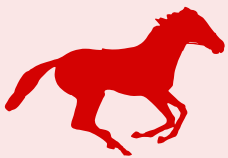


PEEWEE DIVISION
